# PREVIEW-APRIL ISSUE OF THE KIWANIS MAGAZINE

The lead artical in the April issue of The Kiwanis Magazine is of a somewhat unusual nature. It is entitled "The Family at the Crossroads" and its author is Dr. Albert D. Heist, chairman of the New York district's interesting committee on Home Environment. Dr. Heist tells of some of the difficulties encountered by the heads of families and offers some remedies for conditoins that exist. Just where Kiwanis fits into the picture is explained.

"Cleveland Makes it Four R's" is the title of an interesting education story by Karl Detzer who has written some very splendid articles having to do with new and effective ways of handling civic problems.

An article of outstanding interest comes from Los Angeles and its author is J. Clark Sellers, past president of the Los Angeles club and former lieutenant governor. Kiwanian Sellers enjoys a world wide reputation as an expert on signatures and questioned documents. He was a government expert in the Hauptman trial. A finely illustrated article tells of some of his most interesting cases. He has titled it "Do You Know Your Own lig ature?"

In the lighter vein is presented "The Speaker Speaks" by Frank Farrington of Delhi, New York who is widely known for his magazine aricles. He is a past president of the Delhi club.

The Boston convention is responsible for an article on "The Glamour of Gloucester" and some additional information of the speakers who will appear on the program. "A Way to Prosperity through Tax Revision" is explained briefly but definitely by W Clement Moore tax expert of Philadelphia.
