The Center since then has completed more than 10,000 appointments with children who desperately needed dental care.

9. Farm-City Week

WHEREAS, the progress, harmony and strength of our peoples are based upon an understanding of their mutual and individual problems; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RE-SOLVED, that Kiwanis International, through local club action, foster Farm-City Week, Oct. 23-29, 1955, to the end that the fact of the interdependence of our citizens is more generally appreciated; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Kiwanis International seek the cooperation of business, industry, farm, ranch and youth organizations and all other interested agencies so that the program will be unselfish in concept, broad in participation and truly national in scope.
