OCEAN BEACH

Speaking from 17 years of experience in the Philippines helping in Uncle Sam's program of preparing the Filipinos for self-government, Judge Jesse George of San Diego scored the critics of U.S. policy in carrying on the Spanish-American war and in freeing the

Philippines from Spanish mis-rule. He referred particularly to the charge made by James Truslow Adams in his four-volume history, the "March of Democracy," that Uncle Sam was imbued by a spirit of imperialism and was seeking to exploit Cuba and the Philippines.

"The author of those volumes gives a distorted idea of the Spanish-American War," he said. "A worse diluted history, I can hardly imagine. Adams' charges have been amply disproved by reliable historians."

The speaker also scored the lack of teaching of American history in the public schools and colleges of this country.

Judge George said he and President Osmena of the Philippine Islands are good friends and that Osmena has given assurance that he trusts the Americans to do the right thing by the Filipinos. While in the Philippines, where he first served a period of enlistment with the American Army, George was under General MacArthur, the father of the present commander of the U. S. armies in the Islands.

Mr. Murphy will be program chairman next week and will put on a Boy Scout program with Harvey Atherton as speaker and numerous Boy Scouts as special guests.
