## HISTORY OF KIWANIS CLUB OF SAN DIEGO

The Kiwanis Club of San Diego received its charter from Kiwanis International on December 20, 1920.

Since that date more than a score of Clubs have grown from this, the

parent club in San Diego County.

The Charter Night Dinner of the San Diego Kiwanis Club was held at Hotel Del Coronado when San Diego became the sixth Club in the California-Nevada-Hawaii District, now numbering more than 17,000 members in more than 300 clubs.

At the first regular club election, San Diego Kiwanians elected W. H. Harry Fraser its first president. Other officers were Gilman Gist and C. E. Reinhart, vice presidents; Homer C. Miller, treasurer; and Luther Ward, secretary. Directors were Claude Woolman, C. H. English, John B. Osborn, H. L. Sullivan, George H. Webb, G. L. Luce, and L. D. Jennings; District trustee was N. I. McDowell (a kind of forerunner to today's office of Lieut. Governor)

The Kiwanis Club of San Diego had 56 charter members. Today there

are 219 members.

Membership grew to 86 by June, 1921 and up to 119 by 1929. The Great Depression also hit the Club and membership dropped to 98, and dropped steadily through 1936 when it reached a low of 73. Since that date it has shown a steady, gradual increase to the present level.

Veteran members recall fondly a meeting on July 26, 1921 at the Sanford Hotel when Harry Fraser and others connived to have the ladies stage the

program as a complete surprise to all members.

San Diego Kiwanis was first represented at an International Convention in June, 1922 when President Rinehart attended the meeting at Toronto, Canada.

Today's million-dollar Children's Hospital out on Kearny Mesa, where it is operated by the San Diego County Crippled Children's Society, owes much of its existence to work done by Kiwanians away back in 1924.

On January 15th of that year, all members pledged \$100 each toward the San Diego Helping Hand Home for children. By February 26th \$65,000 was raised, and the members with District Governor Heber Winder attended the corner-stone laying of the institution.

Eventually it became the San Diego Children's Home, and then the

"Home" became "Hospital."

Through the years, the Convalescent Hospital treated thousands of children and has been of incalculable value to the community in the treatment of post-polio patients.

In 1952 the Board of the Children's Convalescent Hospital, composed principally of members of this club, merged with the San Diego County Crippled Children's Society to bring about the realization of today's Children's Hospital, one of the most modern of its type in the world, and replacing the now outmoded but beloved Children's Convalescent Hospital.

An old Roster of Membership reveals that First President W. H. "Harry" Fraser and the Club leaped vigorously into community activities putting over the Community Chest Drive with great success. At that time, Kiwanis was meeting at the San Diego Hotel and music was furnished by an All-Kiwanis orchestra of 10 pieces! Membership increased by 33% during that first year.

The following year (1923) was a noteworthy (and newsworthy) one for San Diego Kiwanians when they were designated the official hosts for Lieutenants McCready and Kelly who landed their plane at San Diego after a takeoff from New York for the first transcontinental flight in aviation history.

San Diego Kiwanis got into District Convention hosting early. Eugene E. Zeiss was General Chairman of the 5th annual District Convention held here that year. He was Club President in 1927.

Among the many outstanding San Diego Kiwanians of the past was Charles E. Rinehart, a charter member of this Club; President in 1922; Lieut. Governor in 1925 and DIS-TRICT GOVERNOR in 1926 and INTERNATIONAL TRUSTEE in 1928-29. An old clipping reveals that the lion's share of credit for raising \$50,000 to rehabilitate Boy Scout Headquarters at the old Indian Village in Balboa Park belonged to the late Mr. Rinehart. He was President of the San Diego Area Council of the Boy Scouts in 1927.

Another Charter Member with a notable record was Claude Woolman who was President of the Board of Education; Director of two banks, leader of the Elks band and a member of the first Tent City Band at Coronado, and active in many other

organizations.

One of the early Perfect Attendance champions was John A. Watson, a Charter Member, who missed only 13 meetings at the HOME CLUB in 12 years, all of which he made up at other Clubs.

Some of the early fine leadership in San Diego Kiwanis came from Los Angeles Kiwanis in the person of the late Sam R. Frazee. He was a Los Angeles Charter Member in 1916 and came to San Diego Kiwanis in 1922. He was President in 1929 and twice served as District Trustee. He was extremely active in the community and was president of a combined group composed of the Merchants' Association and Merchants' Credit Association.

Now an Honorary Member of the San Diego Kiwanis Club is John J. "Jack" Fraser who was Charter Secretary of the Club as well as being a Charter Member. Jack was a leader in the fund-raising for the original Helping Hand Home. In 1954 he made a sizeable contribution toward the erection of a San Diego Kiwanis plaque at the new Children's Hospital. As Secretary for many years, Jack contributed tremendously to the successful growth of the Club.

Another notable early (and still is) member was R. L. "Bob" Mueller, President in 1928 and later Lieutenant Governor. After that Bob served the Club for many years as Secretary and was known throughout the District for his outstanding work for Kiwanis in that field. Bob (now a Privileged Member) has also contributed a great deal to the development of Chula Vista and has been a member of the Board of Education there for over a quartercentury.

Coming down to more recent years, our now firmly established Southern California Kiwanis High School Basketball Tournament was started by President O. W. Todd Jr. in 1947.

In 1948 under President A. M. "Monk" Sanders, the Children's Convalescent Hospital received more than \$8,000 for capital improvements and Kiwanians worked in the Hospital yard mowing grass, cutting hedges and general cleanup.

In 1949 President Richard "Dick" Nelson made this a "singing club" with great development of the Kiwanis Chorus. It was also a strong year in Public Affairs with members distributing over 17,000 "It's Fun to Live in America" pamphlets a month. 1949 also saw the initial National "Kids Day."

In 1950 under President Dwight E. Keider the Club financial structure was reorganized to give the

club a sound financial program for the future, the wisdom of which has been proved by the ensuing years. Top program of the year was honoring nine of our members with the Kiwanis Legion of Honor upon their attaining 25 years of membership. "Kids Day" reached new high proportions with more than 30,000 youngsters participating.

In 1951 under President S. Robert "Bob" Frazee the Club assumed sponsorship for a Kiwanis Little League Baseball Team, and indeed participated actively in pioneering the second Little League formed in this area. The Children's Convalescent Hospital, "Kids Day" and other regular projects received added impetus under Bob's leadership.

In 1952 under the leadership of Howard Carroll the Club set out to be the best Kiwanis Club in the United States and Canada. It was. The Club first won the California-Nevada-Hawaii District Achievement award and then finally the supreme Kiwanis award, the Kiwanis International Gold Division Achievement award.

In 1953 under genial President Leo B. Calland, the Club greatly increased the scope of its activities in a variety of fields, particularly in public affairs and boys and girls work. The preliminary steps for forming the San Diego Kiwanis Foundation came at the behest of President Leo who also contributed to further strengthening of the Club's financial position.

The cultured voice of Dr. Herbert C. Peiffer Jr., Dean of Students at San Diego State College, added a great dignity to the weekly meetings during his 1954 Presidency. He reemphasized a return of the Kiwanis Chorus to our luncheon programs and streamlined Board of Director meeting Procedures to a new level of efficiency. With 29 new members brought in, he increased the size and strength of the Club, meanwhile continuing the development of regular club activities. He sought for and obtained the 1955 District Convention for San Diego.

The Convention will be under the able General Chairmanship of Russel S. Stowell, President of the Club in 1943 and later Lieut. Governor. He has twice before been General Chairman of the District Convention at San Diego. It will be the Club's major event for 1955 along with the celebration events for the 40th Anniversary Year of Kiwanis International.

Floyd Snyder's Public and Business Affairs Committee has gotten organized to bring the influence of those good men to bear in this vital area of activity.

When we close our Anniversary Meeting Tuesday I am going to ask you to stand and all together, in one voice rededicate ourselves as KI-WANIANS to service to our community, to our Republic,—to our KIWANIS objectives and ideals. Thus we will embark upon the fifth decade of going "FORWARD IN KIWANIS."
