Total War Bonds Sold through our Club \$2,186,207.50

Jim McKinney, chairman of the War Bond Committee made his final report to the club in the recent campaign.

The amount was somewhat staggering for it more than doubled the desired quota.

One hundred per cent of the members bought bonds and the membership itself bought nearly one hundred thousand dollars worth.

The entire sum recorded as bought by our members and sold through them reached the staggering sum of \$2,186,207.50.

We are proud of this achievement as it again shows that with a little effort on the part of the individual, much can be accomplished.



Our own California-Nevada District has several excellent scores to its credit and reached an all time high during April with 38 Clubs having attained the 100% mark.

This is a good mark to shoot at and our club should and must come more nearly making their goal than past records indicate.

Few of us really understood the word "dynamic" until we heard the talk given Tuesday by George Rony, foreign born Natura ized citizen. Russia and her future policies as his subject.

Giving a very clear picture of relations with Russia and the probable intent of that country in her future relations with the world domination, her Asiatic policies and intentions, we have much to think about and undoubtedly there is much that can be read between the lines in the various talks and statements by Russia during the recent past periods of re-establishment of "peace".

A situation is rapidly arising in which all major nations must watch carefully their development lest we find ourselves sitting on another keg of dynamite in the near future.

With Europe in the throes of a continental revolution, with chaos and mistrust seemingly dominating the thoughts of nation against nation, with the desire uppermost in the mind of certain European countries of greater domination, it behooves us to look well into our own house to start to straighten out a sore mess, created by the present war spirit prevailing the world.

Mr. Rony is a student of these world problems and certainly seems to be in a clear knowledge of things to come as he formerly predicted several world events which came to being as predicted, these being all predicted upon his careful study of conditions and his predictions for future events to come will be well worth watch-
