# Hamilton Holt International President

NOTED GEORGIA
BUSINESSMAN TO
HEAD KIWANIS

Hamilton Holt, nationally known granite manufacturer and president of the Associated Industries of Georgia, was elected president of Kiwanis International at a meeting of the International Council June 25 to 27 at Chicago.

The Council, consisting of the Officers and Trustees, Governors, and Past Presidents of Kiwanis International, convened for the two-day session following a decision of the board to cancel the annual convention for the third consecutive year in line with wartime travel restrictions.

### Long Experience

In succeeding Ben Dean, Grand Rapids advertising executive, as president, Hamilton Holt will draw upon years of Kiwanis experience in carrying out the duties of his new position. He is the immedaite past treasurer, a former member of the board, and one time International committee chairman. His record also includes the presidency of the Kiwanis Club of Macon and

governorship of the Georgia Kiwanis District.

The new president, who resides at Macon, Ga., has long been active in southern business circles. He is a member of the Governor's War Council and the State Commission to Revise the Georgia Constitution, a trustee of Mercer University, Macon, Ga., and vice chairman of the Committee on Group Cooperation for the National Association of Manufacturers.

### Pledges War Support

In his inaugural address, President Holt declared that some 2,300 Kiwanis clubs and approximately 150,000 members throughout the United States and Canada will continue to actively support the war against Japan until victory has been achieved.

He urged Kiwanians in the year ahead to throw their weight behind the San Francisco charter for a world peace organization, to care for returning service men and women, and "to do everything possible to protect and maintain our democratic form of government."

Immediate Past President Dean will continue to serve on the International Board for the ensuing year. He succeeds Donald B. Rice, Oakland, Calif., who served as president during the 1943-44 administrative year.


