DATE OF DRIVE—May 14 to June 30, 1945. Savings Bonds E, F, and G and Savings Notes Series C sold in April, May and June will be included in the drive.

The Payroll Savings campaign will start aggressively in April.

SECURITIES OFFERED—Savings Bonds: Series E, F, and G Bonds; Series C Savings Notes.

New Issues—Dating and maturity to be announced later: 7/8% Certificates, 1½% Bonds, 2¼% Bonds, 2½% Bonds. Corporation subscriptions for new issues will be available from June 18 through

June 30. Corporations will not be permitted to subscribe for 1½% bonds. Detailed information and restrictions will be given later.

OCEAN BEACH

More evidence of the great work that the Red Cross is doing for the servicemen was provided to Kiwanis Club members at their Tuesday meeting by the two speakers of the evening, James Knowles of Ocean Beach, a leader in Red Cross activity down town, and by Jack Porte of Mission Beach, chairman of the American Legion County Welfare Society. Knowles had arranged for two members of the Marine Corps from the local Marine base to assist in putting on a 10-minute program of moving pictures of what the Red Cross is doing in this war. The two Ma-rines were Sgt. Ed Phillips of New York City and Pfc. Howard Gatlin of Del Rio, Texas. Program chairman for the evening was Earl Shaw.

Knowles declared that the biggest job the Red Cross is doing is for the men in the service, and for after the war the biggest Red Cross job is expected to be rehabilitation of the civilians in the war devastated countries of the world.

Porte, who in civilian life is a sculptor, thrilled his listeners with a graphc account of hs seven years of duty with the famous French Foreign Legion, and at conclusion replied to many questions about the Legion. The Legion, he said, had done considerable development work as well as policing of the Arabs in the French colonies of North Africa. He closed with a plea for the Red Cross.

Wm. Don Thomson of Ocean Beach was a visitor at the meeting, a guest of Joe R. Lownes.
