EDITORIAL

THE CAPTAINS AND THE KINGS

Gone are those captains and kings whose martial presence has smoked up wars, Kipling assured us in his best iambics. But they have not gone far. Not far enough, anyway.

Otherwise there would be no need for Armed Forces Day. Indeed, there would be no need for the Armed Forces if those with war in their hearts were

really departed.

Evidence that the war makers still hang around is seen in the echoes of tumult and shouting that reach us from afar . . . One kind of Chinese shoots at another kind . . . A riot in Singapore . . . The guard changes in Saigon to the accompaniment of musketries' clatter . . . Phantom planes attack American planes on a peaceful mission over the Yellow Sea . . . Tumult, shouting.

Not much, we say, but enough to demand that we post an armed guard. It demands that we keep several million trained men ready, just in case.

Most of those we send into uniforms would prefer to be in civvies. They do their nation's bidding amazingly well, however, considering the manner of their being called. They train well and they fight superbly well, when need arises, because they are Americans.

Armed Forces Day was established to honor these men who give so devotedly of their lives so that their country might be secure and so that the

great tradition of America's arms might live.

The world at this uneasy hour is divided over a basic concept. One part has spokesmen who declare they and their ideology must and will rule all the world. They have crucified millions on the altar of stateism, and more millions will suffer and perish in those hopeless fires of idealism, if the evil have their victory.

Standing against the evil ones is the other side, our side. Advocates of our side insist that individual liberties are the foundation of human happiness and usefulness. We fought and won a couple of wars which had their roots in this concept. We may fight still another, though God forbid that this sacrifice be

demanded of us.

Our leaders are striving mightily to make sure that our Armed Forces shall not be summoned to battle. We have armed the atom for war, if it be needed. We are harnessing the atom for peace, if peace is to be our lot. Wherever possible we fight ideologies with ideology. Diplomats try to detour conflict.

In order to see even a remote prospect for success, our leaders and diplomats must "lead from strength." The Armed Forces give them that strength, and they give us at home a cause for gratitude for the security we enjoy and

cherish.


