"GIVE THANKS - HUMBLY"

Thanksgiving Day, born of want and travail, will be observed this week in an atmosphere of abundance so great as to suggest pagan greed. Indeed, this abundance is so much a part of our daily lives that we take it for granted and find difficulty in being genuinely thankful.

None would suggest that we abandon the good things we are blessed with, or that we reduce our status to that of the Pilgrims who gave us Thanksgiving Day. There is nothing

to lead to the belief that earth's offerings were not meant for our use and enjoyment.

But there is reason to believe that we should not be smug about what we have. There is reason to believe that what we enjoy may be the result of divine guidance which early settlers were willing to follow.

This guidance gave us protection for human rights, and these rights inspired our people to endeavors which have added to our welfare and comfort. The very fact that we can go to the church of our choice, or go to no church, on Thanksgiving Day is one of the law-protected rights we cherish, and for which we should give thanks.

From this right, and from companion rights spelled out in the First Amendment of the Constitution, we have found inspiration to build an economy which pours its blessings upon our millions. It is significant that these blessings have been shared over the world where want plagues peoples. and for this we should be glad. We should be glad for the grace and for the inspiration which led us to those acts of charity, and for the opportunity given us to be charitable.

Humbly and gratefully let Kiwanians bow their heads in thanks for God's providence which has made America great among nations. Our tables and those around them at this season reflect that guiding providence, a fact we never should forget.
