International President Holt announces new Club Objectives

When Japan surrendered to the Allies and thoughts of all Americans and Canadians turned to peacetime reconversion, President Hamilton Holt immediately issued Kiwanis International's post-war objectives and urged clubs to consider ways and means of rendering greater community service.

"Since Dunkirk and Pearl Harbor," Holt declared, "Kiwanis manpower has been marshalled behind the Allied war effort. These resources now will be directed toward the building of peace, unity and opportunity"."

The Kiwanis theme for 1946 will be "Build for Peace—Unity—Opportunity."

The nine post-war objectives of Kiwanis International's 149,000 members in 2,300 communities follow:

- Develop an understanding of the United Nations Charter in support of world peace.
- 2. Aid returning veterans.
- 3. Strengthen democracy by per-

- sonal acceptance of citizenship responsibilities.
- 4. Expand your services to build character and citizenship.
- 5. Mobilize public opinion in support of individual enterprise and opportunity.
- 6. Encourage sound programs of reconversion.
- 7. Conserve natural resources for sound national economy.
- 8. Further good will between Canada and the United States as an outstanding example of international cooperation.
- 9. Develop national unity through increased emphasis on human and spiritual values.

versant with the rules governing the membership of military service members.

The International Board of Trustees has ruled that upon the return of military service members, they shall be restored to their original classification.

They also shall be granted the privilege of retaining their military service status within the club for a period of one year following their discharge.

Better than 71 per cent of the members already discharged have been reinstated into active membership, but every returned Kiwanian has the right of retaining his military service membership for one year to cover the period of his readjustment to civilian life.

Another important ruling affects those members who were disabled while in service. It follows:

"The term of military service membership is extended to cover any member disabled in the armed service of his country as long as he is eligible for 50 per cent or more government disability compensation."

The period of military service membership will not interrupt a member's perfect attendance record. Any perfect attendance record shall be figured on the basis of a continued record accomplished before and after the period of military service membership.

PAST PRESIDENTS REAFFIRM STAND ON MEMBERSHIP

The International Board of Trustees has aproved a recommendation by the Past International Presidents with respect to the Kiwanis stand on non-multiple membership in service organizations.

Kiwanis International has taken the position that members of its 2,300 clubs throughout the United States and Canada should refrain from affiliating with other community service organizations.

The board also approved a recommendation by the Past International Presidents that new members are fully informed as to the ideals and responsibilities of Kiwanis and that each new member be given a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws and information concerning Objects and Objectives.

It was interesting to note on a recent visit to Sacramento to the School Trustees Convention that at a dinner table consisting of four men and their wives, three of the men were Kiwanians.

MAILS OPEN TO EUROPE EXCEPT FOUR AREAS

The mails are now open to all Europe—except Germany, Hungary, Albania and Austria.

Only letters may be sent to Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Estonia, Finland, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Romania and Switzerland and to all parts of Italy except Rome, Naples, Sardinia and Sicily and the Vatican City.

Air mail service rates are 30 cents for half an ounce and 5 cents for the first ounce of first-class mail and 3 cents for each additional ounce.

Parcel Post may be sent to all other European countries, but is limited to a maximum of five lbs.
