EDITORIAL

"ELECT, SUPPORT AND RECOGNIZE WORTHY PUBLIC OFFICIALS"

- - - 6th Kiwanis Objective for 1955

Political action offers Kiwanis a field of interest and action as broad as any, and it is a good field.

It is good because it provides an area of human activity constantly needing improvement.

Too often the word "politics" connotes that which is questionable, if not evil, in public affairs. Venal men, sometimes referred to as politicians, have taken over a necessary activity and have covertly directed it to their selfish ends. These become merchants of special favors, or buyers of privilege. For a price they deal in rights which do not belong to them. These are our rights.

So often has this happened in public life that we easily come to believe that all politics is crooked and that all politicians are for sale.

This, of course, is not so. We see around us "worthy public officials" of highest integrity. Their administrations and their judgments are supported by principle which none can assail.

Here we have two concepts of politics, and in between there is a wide area for Kiwanis activity. We need not be high ranking servants of government to be effective, but Kiwanians do need to be alert and courageous. They must be alert to detect evil or weakness, and they must be courageous in condemning and correcting wrongdoing.

Kiwanis is proud to claim among its members many men who have gained and who hold political office. It is privileged to inspire and support these men. This Kiwanis can do in a practical manner. This it has done in past years.

In the United States the practice of politics is the practice of government. In a sense, each of us is a politician, though we may never get closer to the forces of government than the polling place. To be effective, we must know the processes of government and we must know the men who direct those processes.

By deliberate design, a reasonable proportion of our programs bring before us men qualified to keep us informed on various aspects of government — of politics. We all can be good listeners, good inquirers. Perhaps it is here that we really enter politics, the polling places merely providing a tool for expressing convictions gained at luncheon meetings.

Truly, Kiwanis in political action is a power exerted for the good of the whole people, not the privileged few.
